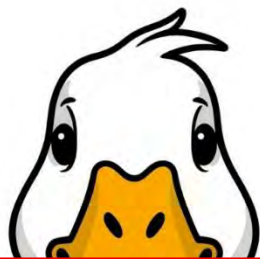

“Humility in Action”

As we come into a new rotation, I want to first wish everyone a very Happy New Year. I also want to thank those who have just completed their rotation as a Trusted Servant and welcome those newly elected and appointed Trusted Servants willing to stand for our Groups, Districts and Area. STEP 1

Using the Big Book, we can turn statements into questions to help identify our own alcoholism. After careful consideration, you may think, "Yes, I am one of them too; I must have this thing." p. 29

Questions to consider...

- Can I start drinking without developing the phenomenon of craving? (pg. xxx)
- Does the description of the allergy differentiate me and set me apart from other people? Am I like other people when it comes to alcohol? (pg. xxx)
- Is the only relief of the physical allergy entire abstinence? (pg. xxx)
- At some stage of my drinking career, do I begin to lose all control of my liquor consumption, once I start to drink? (pg. 21)
- When drinking, do I have little control over the amount I drank? (pg. 44)
- Have I lost the power of choice to drink? (pg. 24)
- Has my so called will power become weak and practically non-existent? (pg. 24)
- Am I unable, at certain times, to bring into consciousness with sufficient force the memory of the suffering and humiliation of even a week or a month ago? (pg. 24)
- Do I have the idea that somehow, someday I will control and enjoy my drinking? Is this idea an obsession of mine? (pg. 30)
- When I honestly wanted to, did I find I could not quit entirely? (pg. 44)



TRADITION 1

"Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity."

This tradition reminds us that unity matters, because none of us gets sober alone.

Practicing Tradition One...

KEEP OUTSIDE ISSUES OUTSIDE

When we disagree, focus on recovery rather than outside topics (politics, religion, personal disputes). This will help to maintain the group's primary purpose.

TAKE A SERVICE COMMITMENT

Making coffee, greeting at the door, helping clean up after the meeting are all simple actions that keep the group functioning. This service anchors us to the fellowship that keeps us sober.

WELCOME THE NEWCOMER

If you're a regular, approach someone new, introduce them to the hall and the members of the group, and offer your phone number. This helps create unity and connection. Someone once did this for us, and it helped us stay.

CONCEPT 1

"The final responsibility and the ultimate authority for AA world services should always reside in the collective conscience of the Fellowship."

A.A.'s authority flows from the shared conscience of our groups, not from an individual or committee. How can this concept be used in our group/area?

- Attend your district and area assemblies so your voice can be heard on matters in AA.
- If confusion arises in a business meeting, call for group conscience on the matter.
- Practice acceptance if group conscience does not agree with your opinion.
- Remember that service position are roles, not positions of power. No one holds authority.

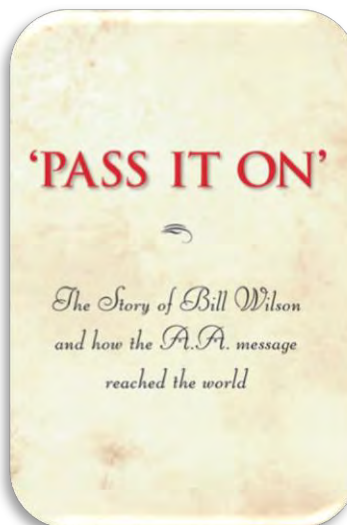
