Each issue will highlight current events, opportunities for service, and stories from our fellowship. Think of it as a bridge between meetings — a way to stay inspired, informed, and involved.

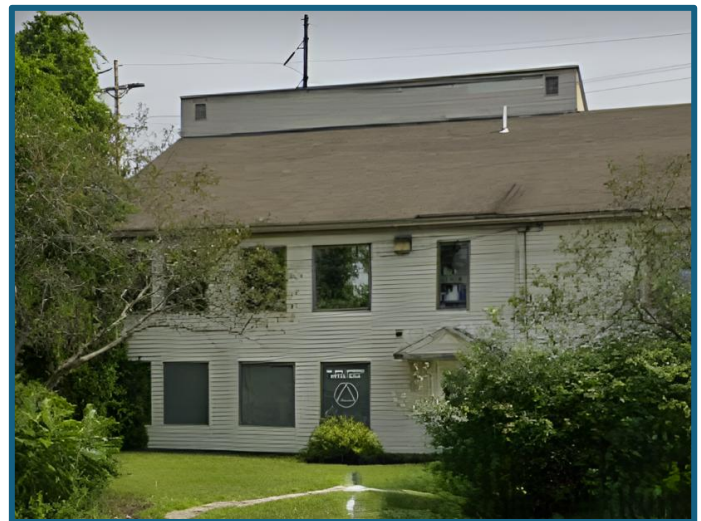
Together, we continue the work of sharing our experience, strength, and hope — one newsletter at a time.

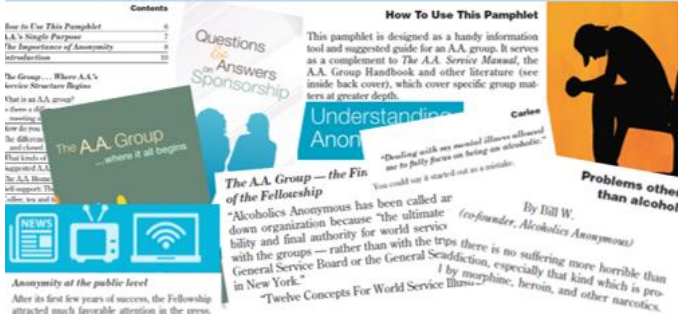

MONTH OF MAY IN AA HISTORY

MAY 8, 1971 – Bill Wilson was buried at the East Dorset Cemetery.

MAY 10, 1935 – Clarence S. announced to the Akron Oxford Group members that the Cleveland members were starting a meeting in Cleveland and calling it Alcoholics Anonymous.

MAY 11, 1935 – Bill Wilson picked up the phone in the Mayflower Hotel and was referred to Dr. Bob.

May 12, 1935 – Bill Wilson met Dr. Bob at Henrietta Seiberling's home, an Oxford Group member.

May 29, 1980 – The book "Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers" was published.

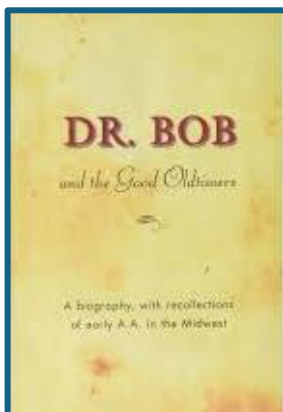
May 1951 – Al-Anon was established by Lois and Anne B.

My First NHAA Convention

"A Life-Changing Weekend for One AA"

My first experience at the area convention was great. It was so organized and it had a lot to offer for someone who was new to service. I've been around AA and have had some experience with service on the NHSCYPAA host committee, so it was cool to see so many familiar faces. There were many people I didn't know, but they recognized me and it was a great feeling to be noticed. The highlight of the weekend was definitely the main speakers and the men's workshop. I had never done a workshop like that and it was really cool to be in a room filled with a bunch of biker dudes, ex-cons, people who were just like me, or even worse, who lived a crazy life and were still able to be vulnerable in a room full of other

men. I felt comfortable sharing and it was nice to not feel judged. When we broke into small groups, there was a lot of talk about what it really meant to be a man of integrity. I realized that most of those things we talked about were things I didn't learn growing up. Things like respect, morals, being a good father, what it means to be a good brother, a husband, a friend, to be compassionate and to not hide behind the walls we'd build. A lot of those words stuck out to me because that is the man I'm trying to become. I felt like my brain was able to open up to another stratosphere of sobriety and it was amazing to see what AA has to offer beyond the meetings. It was a great experience and I'm really glad I went. -Mason P.

We all have a story, we'd like to hear yours!


